From Susan Ulino:


We had a rotten tree in our yard, near the road, that was ready to fall. We notified our town and they came to cut it down. I made them cookies.

An interesting conversation came up at this past District Board meeting. At the conference, there will be a pajama party on Friday night; games, cookies, all kinds of fun and prizes. We started to talk about decorations and the subject of balloons came up.

I almost went ballistic. Why you may ask would object to them? Balloons are bright and colorful and it seems that no celebration is complete without them.

Well, here's why I so strongly objected. As you know, plastic is non-biodegradable and finds its way into all kinds of places it shouldn't be, like the ocean.
